Species seen during trips varies depending on time of year, weather, sea conditions, and prey resources. Most species are seen more frequently and in larger numbers summer to early fall while others are here in spring and fall or year round.

Puffins, razorbills, and murres as well as terns are seen more frequently on our puffin cruises from May-early August. The nesting season for puffins, razorbills and terns usually peaks in July. Other species use the Gulf of Maine as a feeding ground and will breed further north or in the southern Hemisphere.



Species seen during boat cruises varies depending on time of year, breeding cycles, weather, sea conditions, and prey resources.

Most of these species are seen more frequently and in larger numbers in the summer to early fall months. Others will be seen in the spring or fall during migration or year round. Most of the alcid, petrel, phalarope, shearwater, jaeger and skua species are found offshore on our whale watch trips or puffin cruises. Most waterfowl and raptors can be seen on our Bay cruises.
