Letter from the Executive Director

This winter at the museum has been busier than usual. After fire and flood in the museum building we have made some upgrades. We renovated a restroom, changing from exterior to interior access. As we go to press, New England Epoxy is pouring a new epoxy floor in the ground floor of the museum. After the flooring has dried and set we will be refreshing the exhibit to highlight the history of the Mount Kineo Hotel. Please plan to join us for a Grand Re-opening over Memorial Day weekend.

In November the Shipyard in

Boothbay Harbor (Bristol Marine) began work on replacement of the Kate's upper fantail. Over the winter months work proceeded at their yard in Boothbay. At the end of March they will return to Greenville to install the new decking.

We continue working with our capital campaign committee to raise funds for continuation of the project. Strategies include donor events, business solicitations and numerous grant requests. It has been gratifying to see how much the community values the Katahdin. We

have also received family contributions. Our donor recognition sub-committee has developed an amazing design for an artwork of

carved wood that will honor those who have supported our efforts.

Regretfully we share the loss of longtime donors Jeannie Wortman and Tad Foote. They will be missed.

We are looking forward to a busy cruising season and hope to see you all at the Donors Cruise on June 17!

Keep Kate Cruising Campaign Enters Second Year

The Keep Kate Cruising Campaign enters the second year just shy of the half-way mark toward its goal of raising \$2 million for preservation of the historic vessel. Launched in the spring of 2022, the fundraising campaign has secured gifts and pledges of \$972,381 as of March 20. "This is a significant accomplishment and we are so grateful to the donors that have made a commitment to the future of the Katahdin," stated John Morrell, Moosehead Marine Museum Board President.

Early gifts to the campaign have allowed the Museum to continue Phase I of the restoration work this winter and spring. While the Kate is docked during the offseason, The Shipyard in Boothbay Harbor (Bristol Marine) has commenced work on the upper fantail deck. Engineers from The Shipyard came to Greenville in November and took laserguided measurements. They are preparing materials for the decking at the yard in

Boothbay Harbor, which will be installed on the Kate when the weather warms this spring. The Shipyard Facility Manager Eric Graves notes, "The Kate is a unique vessel with a long and impressive history in Maine. We are so proud to be working on this project to ensure that she can continue to cruise on Moosehead Lake well into the future."

The last major deck restoration on the Katahdin was completed more than 25 years ago. It has been 28 years since the hull was reclad. The keel was repaired in 2012. With the successful completion of the Keep Kate Cruising Campaign, the Museum will replace the upper deck, replace the green rail along the perimeter, haul the boat out of the lake, sandblast and paint the hull and complete any other required maintenance.

"We cannot express how grateful we are to those who have donated to the campaign," said Executive Director Liz McKeil. "We still have a way to go to reach our goal so that the restoration of the Kate can be completed, but I am touched by the generosity of so many people who love the Kate and want to see her cruising on the Lake for the next 25 years."

We hope you will join others in supporting this exciting project to preserve the Katahdin. You may choose to make a gift in memory or in honor of someone close to you. The Legacy of a Family and a Steamboat

Greenville, Maine is a small town with great history.

Some families' legacies span centuries and through generations. Such is the legacy of the family of Captain Stillman and Bertie Sawyer.

Stillman Sawyer served as general manager of the Coburn Steamboat Company in the early 1900s, prior to which he built the steamboat Twilight and helped to construct the Katahdin at Shipyard Point. Almost one hundred years later, Stillman's granddaughters Keyth Carter and Lea Watt are members of the Keep Kate Cruising Campaign Committee. Together, many descendants of Capt. Stillman and Bertie Sawyer have raised significant gifts for the campaign, contributing toward the preservation of the Katahdin's legacy and the replacement of her decking and rail. "Our family loves Greenville and Moosehead

Lake," Keyth Carter said,
"and so much of our history
is tied to the steamboats."
A family's legacy is a powerful thing.

The 1920s and 1930s were pivotal in the history of Greenville. In the 1920s, the town saw great prosperity, as Stillman Sawyer and the Coburn Steamboat Company ran numerous steamboats up and down Moosehead Lake, cruising on a regular schedule and hauling passengers, supplies, and mail to hotels, sporting camps, and private cottages. It was a heyday.

In the 1930s, life changed drastically, as roads were built and steamboat travel waned. According to the diaries of Stillman's wife Bertie, in 1934, they "started to take the engine out of the Katahdin." She wrote in 1935 that Stillman "got word that he was released from the mail con-

tracts, so no more boats. I am feeling sad about it."

But the Sawyer family and the town of Greenville loved the steamboats. Bertie wrote that several "men about town," including Louis Oakes, D. M. Ward, Folsom Prentiss Co., E. L. Dean, C. Max Hilton, A. A. Crafts, and Stillman Sawyer, gathered to purchase some of the boats and together, they extended the life of the steamboats into the late 30s.

In the 1940s, the steamer Moosehead burned and the Twilight sank at its mooring. Only the Katahdin was left. She was sold to Hollingsworth & Whitney, the logging company that preceded Scott Paper Company. She persevered through decades and was acquired by the Moosehead Marine Museum. Stillman

and Bertie Sawyer did not see her renaissance when they passed away in the 60s, but their family certainly did. When the Kate took her maiden voyage as a restored cruising vessel in the 1980s, Stillman's daughters Erma Harvey and Frances Richards stood at her bow and christened her with a bottle of champagne. Son Henry Sawyer had worked as a teenager on the boats with his dad, and in 2019, Stillman's 98 year-old daughter Virginia Osgood steered the Katahdin and could still tell the captain which rocks to avoid in the East Cove. "They rode in those boats as children with their father," Keyth explained. "The boats were like a member of the family."

Generations later, the boats are still part of the Sawyer family's legacy, as contributions in the Stillman and Bertie Sawyer family's name are helping to keep Kate cruising in 2023.


EARLY FUNDRAISING SUCCESS HAS ENABLED US TO START PHASE ONE OF THE FIVE-YEAR PROJECT: REPLACEMENT OF THE AFT UPPER DECK (OR "UPPER FANTAIL" OF THE KATE—THE AREA WITH THE MOST PASSENGER LOADS). IN LATE NOVEMBER, BRISTOL MARINE CAME ABOARD THE KATE TO TAKE PRECISE MEASUREMENTS USING LASER TECHNOLOGY. OVER THE WINTER MONTHS, USING THEIR LASER MEASUREMENTS, THE CRAFTSMEN AT THE SHIPYARD HAVE BEEN BUILDING OUT THE REPLACEMENT DECK IN SECTIONS. THEY WILL RETURN TO MOOSEHEAD LAKE IN MARCH TO BEGIN DEMOLITION AND REPLACEMENT OF THE DECK. OBSERVERS CAN EXPECT TO SEE SOME SHRINK WRAP TO PROTECT THE WORK CREW FROM THE ELEMENTS. TARGET DATE FOR COMPLETION OF PHASE ONE IS JUNE 1, 2023, SO KATE WILL BE READY TO BEGIN HER CRUISING SEASON IN MID-JUNE!

1966

The Hotel was run as a Treadway Inn until it closed in 1969. The building deteriorated and was demolished in 1995.











1911

The Mt. Kineo House was owned by the Kineo Company and operated by the Hiram Ricker Hotel Company. A large dining room, annex, cottages, and accommodations for 500 guests made it one of the finest hotels in the country.

1950

The hotel annex building and cottages were reopened to the public, run by the Louis Oakes family.

Once a Friend of the Kate, Always a Friend of the Kate

When we think of our friends, words like character, humor, respect and affection likely come to mind. The immediacy of these words and qualities ebb and flow over time as we interact with the important people in our lives, but they are what sustain our friendships. If we're lucky, they also apply to people in our community whom we may not know as intimately as our friends, but we often feel that we "know" them because they've shown these characteristics.

One such person in our Greenville community was Ab Graham, known by most as just Ab. A small man, disabled by an accident in early childhood, Ab lived his entire life in Greenville. He had an outwardly quiet personality, but a definite impish streak, and a deep appreciation of Moosehead Lake and the steamboat Katahdin. While the disability in one arm and one leg kept him from doing heavy work, Ab was a dedicated deck hand and was always on the Katahdin. He took pride in polishing the brass fixtures on the boat, greeting passengers and occasionally steering the boat. If you ask the folks who worked with him, they often say, "Ab was the boat!"

Al Dinsmore, one of the Kate's captains in the 1980s, recounts the time when he initially interviewed for the job of captain with Lou Hilton. After the interview, he was given

a tour of the boat. When they met, Al recalls Ab's look as if to say, you may become the captain, but this is my boat! "We worked well together and became long-time friends," recalls Al. "He came down and visited us years later when I was captaining a ferry out of Rockland to one of the islands. He was a great guy."

Everyone who knew Ab had a story about him. For example, one year, a group of bagpipers from Scotland came to Maine. To the initial surprise of many, Ab, proud of his Scottish ancestry, came to the concert in his finest Highland dress: kilt, buckles and sporran cantle!

One recurring story about Ab was that every year when ice-out was declared, Ab would climb up to the top of the boathouse near the Katahdin berth and dive into the water! Not something for the faint of heart, and definitely an original polar plunge!

One story that sums up Ab, his character and his dedication to the Katahdin became known near the end of his life. One day, Ab walked into the Museum office carrying a shoebox, and in it was his life-long savings of \$10,000, which he donated to the Katahdin. Like those who grew up here as kids, as well as folks who have come to our area because of the natural beauty, Ab Graham appreciated the Katahdin as the living legacy of the rich history of the Moosehead region and its dynamic present.
