
Marine Discovery Seals in the Mounts Bay West area in 2022 reported to SRT


Seal numbers from 28th March to 14th November 2022

Seal counts in main tour season



Maximum count: 18 on 5th July. January is not included in the graph as the boat was out of water in winter but there was a land-based survey on 3rd January when 7 seals were counted.

Age and sex of seals seen



More females were recorded than males.


Adult Male 28% Adult Female 41% Adult Unknown 2%

Juveniles are grouped together in one category as sex unknown.

Adults and Juveniles





The ratio of juveniles to adults was fairly constant through the year, at around half or just below, except for:

March when the numbers were equal. July when there were fewer juveniles.

July had the highest numbers of adults, perhaps the juveniles did not haul out with them or had to use less obvious haul out positions and were not counted.

Photo identification

In the season, April to October, **423** photo identifications were made in the photos from Marine Discovery and an additional **24** photo identifications were made in the records received from other people. **Total 447**

A lot of these photo identifications will be repeats of the same seals as several seals have now been identified as regulars at this haul out.

39 individuals that were already in the catalogue were re-identified. 25 individuals were added to the catalogue.

SCF1 Kelp Cx was identified 38 times between 28/03/2022 and 24/09/2022.

SCM13 Silverback was identified 56 times between 30/03/2022 and 28/09/2022.

The regulars

These visit calendars show all the sightings in the CSGRT database, not just those from Marine Discovery.

Records from Marine Discovery start in 2012 and make up the bulk of the sightings of seals on the Mounts Bay West haul out site as seals are much more easily observed from the seaward side.

First recorded in 2001, this juvenile female reappeared in 2022. With more photos we have been able to match up several different catalogue entries as all being her.


The December 2022 record is from a land-based survey using a telescope.

It appears that she usually moves away from the Mounts Bay area at the end of the summer.

In the winter of 2022, she was not recorded in West Cornwall but was recorded there in January 2023.

Interesting that there are no records of this seal in 2016 and 2018 and only a single record in 2017.

SCF20 Mask was identified 37 times between 09/04/2022 and 18/09/2022. As an adult female, she visits Mounts Bay in the summer to feed, then moves away to have her pup. She hasn't been identified anywhere else so it could be that she returns post pupping, but we have no winter records.

SC215 Coral SL100 white tag

Coral was rescued as a 3-week-old pup, from Millook Beach near Bude, on 15th September 2021. The British Divers Marine Life Rescue (BDMLR) marine mammal medics found her with wounds and an eye injury.

After a few days in the hospital at the Cornish Seal Sanctuary, a decision was made to remove her injured right eye

Coral healed well and was soon able to feed herself and to swim.

She was released on 15th December 2021, on the north coast near Gunwalloe, after she reached a healthy weight of more than 30kg.

In 2022, Coral was first seen and recorded by Marine Discovery on 30th March 2022, and seen a further 32 times up to 11th October 2022.


